

- Your neighbors must recognize the laws and freedoms that you have. Your neighbors will also follow these laws and will avoid doing anything that goes against your rights and freedoms!
- A child means any person under the age of 18.

19	You have the right to live with your parents, and you will only be separated if the Government needs to protect you.
20	Your parents or guardians should always protect you and treat you in the best way possible.

No one has the right to make you fight in a war as a soldier.



If you are refugee then you have the right to protection and humanitarian help.



If you are separated from your parents then you can receive special protection and be placed in temporary care. You will also get help to find your parents.



Governments have to help you if you live in an area where you are not treated equally.



No one is allowed to take advantage of you in any way.



You are protected from being forced to use drugs.



You have the right to be free from any kind of human trade. Your Government will protect you from being kidnapped or sold to anyone else.
